

MRS. JOHN HAUSER, AGED 35, EXPIRES

END COMES AT HOME NEAR
WHITEWATER—BURIAL
TO BE HERE.

Mrs. John Hauser, aged 35, passed away at 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon at her home near Whitewater, according to word received here. Last September, Mrs. Hauser was paralyzed by a stroke and another one, coming yesterday, caused her death. For several months she had been helpless.

Frances Tavenson was married in 1910 in Monroe to John Hauser. Following his return from service in the world war they moved to Whitewater to reside on a farm.

The husband and five children, including twins only two weeks old, survive. The older children are: Julia, Gladys and Helen. The deceased's father and a sister also survive.

The remains will be brought by motor from Whitewater, Sunday afternoon. They will be taken to St. John's Evangelical church where Rev. P. A. Schuh will conduct the funeral at 2 o'clock. Burial will be in Greenwood cemetery. *Mon 26/1927*

Burial services will be conducted at 3:30 p. m. Sunday at Greenwood cemetery for John Peter Hauser, who died at his home in Sullivan, Wis., Thursday. Rev. E. A. Henderson, Elkhorn, will officiate at the funeral in Palmyra with members of the American Legion post there conducting services. Glen Zilmer post, Monroe American Legion, will serve at the cemetery services.

John Peter Hauser was born at Monticello Nov. 2, 1887, the son of John and Euphemia Babler Hauser. He lived there for many years and moved to Aberdeen, S. D., where he was married to Florence Tolsted, who died in 1927. In 1932, he married Frances Benkert at Belvidere. He had resided at Sullivan for the past 23 years.

Surviving are his wife, one brother, Henry Hauser, Monroe; two sisters, Mrs. Susan Benkert and Mrs. Arthur Kubly, Monroe; five daughters, Mrs. John Burri, Gratiot, Mrs. Lawrence West, La-Grange, Mrs. Ellsworth Willson, Sullivan, and Joan and Belva, at home; and two sons, Robert and Jackie, also at home. His parents, one brother, one sister and two children are deceased. There are six grandchildren also surviving.

Farmer Dies of *Sept. 13* Heart Attack in *1945* Field at Palmyra

Palmyra—John Hauser, 59, a resident of this vicinity most of his life, dropped dead of a heart ailment Thursday afternoon in a corn field on the Frank Northey farm where he was assisting with silo filling. He had operated a farm in the Oak Hill community since coming here from Monroe a number of years ago.

Shirley Pethick, who was working with Mr. Hauser at the time he was stricken, summoned Dr. Elmer Bertolaet, Palmyra, and the Jefferson county coroner.

Mr. Hauser was born in Green county Nov. 2, 1885, and married Frances Benkert of Monroe. He is survived by his wife; six daughters, Mrs. Lawrence West, La Grange, Mrs. Helen Willson, Palmyra, Mrs. John Burri, South Wayne, Ind., Mrs. T. Ott, Monroe, Delba and Joan Hauser, both at home; three sons, Gerald, of Monroe, Jack and Robert, both at home; one brother, Henry Hauser, Monroe; two sisters, Mrs. Arthur Kubly and Mrs. Susan Benkert, both of Monroe; and five grandchildren.

The funeral will be held at 2 p. m. Sunday in the Smith funeral home, the Rev. E. A. Henderson, Lutheran church, officiating. Burial will be in Monroe where Mr. Hauser was a member of St. John's Evangelical Lutheran church.
