I looked for both of these in the Declarations of Intent and could not find them. I check both the certificate number and the date. I did find a John McGarry, certificate #1996, giving up allegiance to the Queen of Great Britain and Ireland on the 1st day of November 1873.

Theory: I think this John McGarry is the one who signed as a witness for Daniel McEvoy.

Note: The IRAD librarians tell me that naturalizations occurred in three stages: declaration of intent, petitions, and court orders. They said that in Cook County, very little information can be found on either the declaration of intent or the court orders, but that the petitions (rich in information) accompany the court orders.
