OFFICERS SEEK PHANTOM

Cattle Country Liable for Fear of Miniature 'Cattle War'

CHEYENNE, Wyo.,

(AP)—A masked man with a snow white horse on a rampage of terrorizing residents of Fletcher Park country in Cheyenne county, is sought by Wyoming officers. The authorities believe his activities presage a miniature war.

Reliable reports received by John Allen, state law enforcement officer, say the masked man has posted notices throughout the area where he operates, threatening certain persons to leave the county. It is reported he has wounded several persons and wounded a horse.

Throughout the district the masked horseman has become known as "the phantom rider." He wears a mask that covers his entire face except the eyes and has been seen astride a snow white horse.

William Alkinson reported the mysterious horseman called on his ranch house and demanded a \$1000 ransom. When the ransom was refused the rider fired through the door, wounding Alkinson.
